Disability and Hope in the Church

Those who have family members with disabilities know first-hand that there are many threats lurking in our current society. Three prominent threats to guard against are: 1) the new eugenics movement and a general obsession with perfection; 2) the messages against healthy sexual development for young adults with intellectual or developmental disabilities (IDD); and 3) the current mental health crisis in our country, which has a disproportionate impact on the disabled.

Any cursory look at statistics regarding these issues can be a discouraging endeavor, but the good news is that there is hope to be found within the Catholic Church. The wealth of Catholic

COME and EXPERIENCE THE MERCY of GOD and the Fellowship of many others who have suffered the hidden pain and destruction of abortion. teaching on the profound dignity of every human person and its emphasis on integral human development provides a clear and encouraging road map to protect families and individuals from these threats, as well as to promote reverence for life in society. Based upon these teachings, Catholic endeavors are actively engaging the culture with a message of hope and wholeness.

In the Diocese of Richmond, the <u>Embracing Grace</u> ministry, headed up by Paula Stryker, seeks to serve parents who receive an adverse prenatal diagnosis with the love and support of others who have gone through similar experiences. With regard to sexual development, the Notre Dame McGrath Institute has published a free course for parents, teachers and ministers called <u>The Body and Beyond: Human Sexuality for Young People with IDD from a Catholic Perspective</u>.

Loneliness is a major factor in anyone's mental health. Combined with the vulnerability of a person with disabilities, loneliness can be exacerbated and cause unbearable suffering. The Church's path to healing is found in the Body of Christ. Our parishes can and ought to be places where those with disabilities are welcomed by people, finding both a sense of purpose and an encounter with the divine, a universal human need. The Word on Fire Institute has an online community dedicated to those with IDD. Their new publication coming out later this month, edited by Mark Bradford, is entitled, Indispensable: A Catholic Guide to Welcoming Persons with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities. In our own commonwealth, Bishop Michael Burbidge has done ground breaking work in the Diocese of Arlington through an independent non-profit, Porto Charities, which promotes inclusion in parishes and Catholic schools, along with meaningful employment, for young people with IDD.

Alongside of these model efforts to guard against the current threats to the disabled stand these wise words from Pope Benedict XVI: "In reality, institutions are not enough, because integral human development is primarily a vocation, and therefore it involves a free assumption of responsibility in solidarity on the part of everyone."
